JIMMY RICE'S MEN REGATTA WINNERS

Veteran Coach's Brockville Oarsmen Take Cup for Third Time

Lachine, Que., July 15.—Superiority of the carefully-coached, finely-trained crews of the Brockville Rowing Club over other clubs in the Eastern Rowing Association appeared clearly defined to-day following their third straight win of the association championship and the Comstock trophy.

Stalwart oarsmen from Brockville swept down the historic old Lachine canal to victory in nine of the 15 events of the association's annual regatta here Saturday to gain 44 points, eight more than Ottawa Rowing Club and 26 more than Lachine, once considered invincible on the water.

Led by Verdell Price, former Canadian junior singles sculling champion, who captured the senior singles, the Brockville oarsmen reflected credit on their coach, the veteran Jimmy Rice, who took over the reins this year after coaching a number of United States crews.

Precision and perfect timing gave Brockville victory in four of the five races for eight. Ottawa capturing the senior open with a fine crew stroked by D. MacFarlane.

A heavy cross-cut wind accounted for one upset and sent another crew into the pier, where they were forced to ship oars. Lachine lost two probable victories by the wind. Newie Falkner, favored in the junior single, was upset and B. Austin of Ottawa finished the race alone.

In the 140-pound class, Lachine led by two lengths only 20 yards from the finish when it was caught by the wind and had to ship oars.

Ottawa registered victories in the heavy high school fours and in the junior heavy four, in addition to winning the senior eight-oar event and the novice and junior singles. Brockville won the 145-pound, junior heavy, high school and 155-pound eights, the senior single, the 135-pound high school fours, the novice four, the junior four and the 155-pound four.
